

Advocacy Talking Points: Child Trafficking

Use these message guidelines to:

- ❖ Craft your own message to send to your elected official;
 - ❖ Serve as an outline for conversations with congressional staff during an office visit;
 - ❖ Guide your comments at speaking engagements or other educational or awareness-raising functions.
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- Every year, more than 1.2 million children are trafficked for their labor. According to the United States Department of State, an estimated 50 percent of all trafficking victims are children under the age of 18.
 - Many countries that have a high rate of human trafficking have tried to implement measures to combat this modern day slavery. However, this political will is often blocked by a lack of financial resources, legal expertise, technical capacity, and other resources that can appropriately protect children and punish perpetrators.
 - The United States can and should do more to help foreign governments end the illegal sale of children for sex and forced labor. The Child Protection Compact Act (HR 2737 and S 3184) is one way we can do this.
 - The Child Protection Compact Act (HR 2737 and S 3184) will provide targeted resources to countries that have shown the political will to combat trafficking but lack the resources and capacity to enforce that will. About the Child Protection Compact Act

- The Child Protection Compact Act (CPCA) (HR 2737 and S 3184) will provide targeted resources to countries that have shown the political will to combat trafficking but lack the resources and capacity to enforce that will. This legislation would help eradicate the exploitation of children for labor or commercial sex in developing countries by offering additional resources for law enforcement, protection of survivors, and deterrence through apprehension and prosecution of traffickers.
- The CPCA authorizes \$30 million over three years for the State Department Trafficking in Persons (TIP) Office to support targeted investments in eligible “focus countries” that have demonstrated a commitment to tackling the problem but lack the necessary resources and technical assistance.
- An important feature of the bill is the requirement that focus countries enter into a “Child Protection Compact” with the United States that identifies strategies for protecting children and deterring the crime, and benchmarks for measuring progress towards meeting specific goals. This includes partnering with local organizations to ensure a constant exchange of information and practices that can help combat trafficking.
- The resources currently available to the State Department Trafficking in Persons office are no match for the growth in child exploitation, both for labor and for commercial sex. The CPCA would better empower the TIP office to work with beneficiary countries to confront child slavery comprehensively and effectively.

Request for House of Representatives

- Co-Sponsor The Child Protection Compact Act HR 2737 and vote for its passage when it comes up for a vote.

Request for Senate

- Co-sponsor The Child Protection Compact Act S.3184 and vote for its passage when it comes up for a vote.
